FIRST CLASS RAJ AND HIS DOUBLE HANDED BACKHAND

Rajiv Patel is one of the best players at Hayes and a Cambridge graduate with a first-class degree.

He can't tell you, though, why he serves right handed and then switches to a left double-handed grip for his next shot.

Is it anything to do with having the same birthday, June 3, as Rafael Nadal?

Raj thinks it probably goes back to his childhood and trying to play with a racket that was too heavy for him.

"The two hands come from using my brother's racket we had in the house.

"There is no good reason why I switch from right handed serve to a left handed grip. It is just what felt natural at the time and I stuck with it."

Raj's backhand can strike fear in an opponent as he sweeps fiercely into the shot which frequently lands deep and fast somewhere near the back line.

Hayes coach Dennis has a lot to do with Raj, who'll be 32 on June 3, turning into a very good player.

Dennis coached Raj for a long time at Park Langley Club and after he left and joined Hayes, Raj moved to Hayes, too,

and continued to receive coaching from Dennis.

Raj plays for our Men's 2 team in the Kent League and our Men's 3 Team in the North Kent League. Sometimes he fills in for the Men's First team. He also plays in the Mixed 2 team, recently predominantly with Janet.

Raj thinks that one of his best results in singles was one of his worst matches, after he got to the final of the Plate.

"I had never played before a crowd before and I could not control my nerves. I had a watch to monitor my heart rate and it was averaging 150-160 beats per minute and I lost the first set 6-0. I had to bring it back. I won the next two sets, I think, by 6-3; 6-4. I took long, deep breaths."

A tough doubles match he remembers well was in blustery Broadstairs where he partnered Phil Jopson and they won both rubbers.

Outside of tennis, Raj has had a distinguished academic career. It began in Royston Primary School in Penge, where there were 35 pupils in his class, and he was often taught by a supply teacher. After he left and joined fee-paying St Dunstan's he was in a class of 18 students.

"If you see the same teacher every day it makes a difference," said Raj.

The upshot was that he passed Maths GCSE at the age of 12. He succeeded in a host of subjects but St Dunstan's pushed him at Maths.

"There was no obvious reason I should be good at Maths. Both my parents are Indian. Mum was born in Kenya and Dad was born in Aden. There was a push from my parents towards Maths and Science."

Raj's father was in the Civil Service and later he worked in London Underground as Station Manager at Brixton.

Raj is aware that his father didn't get jobs because of racism.

"My mother didn't have the same problems because she worked for the State Bank of India as a bank clerk for 40 years.

"People of Indian origin aren't shy of work. My parents worked hard to make sure they had enough money to provide for the kids. Indian people are pushed to get academic qualifications. They are also pushed towards medicine because people respect doctors."

At 18 Raj went to Cambridge University and left with a First Class degree in Maths.

Now he works in a hedge fund in London as a researcher.

"I research and build systematic trading strategies for stocks and cryptocurrencies which ultimately get used as part of the wider fund's portfolio.

"The crux of it is to use data to create an algorithm for trading stocks and crypto currencies. The customers are simply investors who deposit their money with the hedge fund for us to invest on their behalf."

Soon Raj will be moving from Anerley to Coulsdon. As Raj is also a member of David Lloyd's club in Beckenham, will he be leaving Hayes? He said, "I don't intend to leave the club as I enjoy the team tennis and the club sessions but I may be around less often than I currently am."
